Goofy Groundhogs!

Groundhogs (Marmota monxax) may not be able to truly predict the weather on Feb 2nd, but they're special nonetheless!



In preparation for true hibernation over winter, in which they sleep for weeks at a time, they eat enough to double their body size. Their burrow systems are dug 5 ft below the frost line and they have special burrows for hibernation. Instead of drinking from a water source, they stay hydrated from their herbaceous diet and dew on grasses.


The Inca Trail to Machu Picchu February 6th at 2:00 pm at the FOC, 2047 Big Hill Rd., Berea


The Inca Trail spans approximately 28 miles of 6,000-13,800 ft elevation change through the Andes Mountain range ending at Machu Picchu. This was part of the Inca Empire Highway that spanned more than 2,500 miles from Quito, Ecuador to Santiago, Chile. Machu Picchu was one of a series of fortified sites for travelers along the Inca Highway. It was "discovered" by Hiram Binham III in 1911 and it became a UNESCO site in 1983.
