The Forest Has a Memory

"May your children hear and breathe the words of our Indigenous ancestors. May we all be so lucky to know an Indigenous future." ~Matika Wilbur, Project 562: Changing the Way We See Native America

In their book *Ecological Forest Management*, Franklin et al. refer to a forest's memories as "biological legacies." These might include downed trees or dead standing trees, distinctive soil conditions, or root sprouts—anything that carries pre-disturbance conditions into the post-disturbance environment. When the chestnut blight swept across the Eastern U.S. in the early 20th century, decimating the American chestnut population by the 1950s, it left behind a memory that still

lingers today.

A decade ago, Clint Patterson, the College Forester, designed a harvest to encourage chestnut sprouts on Pinnacle Knob, a sandstone ridge that lies at 1500-1600 feet above sea level in elevation—ideal growing conditions for American chestnut. By opening up the forest canopy and allowing light to reach the forest floor, the harvest uncovered hundreds of chestnut sprouts.

Since then, the Berea College Forestry Department has been managing the area in collaboration with the Kentucky chapter of The American Chestnut Foundation (KTACF) as an in-situ orchard. Despite the success of the initial harvest, the chestnut sprouts were still not flowering after over a decade of growth. Last year, we selectively harvested trees that overtopped the largest chestnut sprouts, and the increased light conditions helped these trees to flower for the first time. Earlier this summer, Ken Darnell from KTACF

collected pollen from one of these trees with the goal of using it in efforts to breed a blight-resistant American chestnut with genes adapted to Kentucky.


